Repentance & Reconciliation

The murder of nine parishioners at Mother Emmanuel in Charleston, SC is a striking example of the racism and hate in our society. In the weeks that followed, we as a parish - not unlike many others - joined together to talk about our feelings, our actions, and our assumptions. We wanted to do something...but what? A group of parishioners have kept the discussion alive, and we offer our parish, our diocese, and anyone interested to join us in these next steps in our struggle.

We will have a service of repentance and reconciliation in the season of Advent on Thursday, December 10 at 7 p.m. Leading up to the service, we will hold several workshops in order to prepare our hearts to repent and be reconciled. Here are the dates: Wednesday, October 21, 6 p.m. – 8 p.m. Wednesday, November 18, 6-8 p.m. Saturday, December 5, 9:30-11:30 a.m.

During these workshops, we will define and discuss how racism and white privilege affect each of us. We want to educate ourselves about race-based inequality in the United States in order to prepare our hearts for the service of reconciliation and repentance. We will not encourage guilt, but understanding. Not hate, but love. We must do this hard work, so we will be aware of the systemic race based favoritism present throughout society. Hagar's House: Likeyshia's Story

I met Likeyshia and her three children, ages six, four, and two, when Epiphany served dinners at Hagar's House emergency shelter for homeless women and children last April. Likeyshia was upbeat at the shelter, and her children were delightful. I learned her story in an article that Gracie Bonds Staples wrote for the *Atlanta Constitution Journal* in early May.

Likeyshia and her three children had been homeless for the past six years. She worked at McDonalds earning about \$800 a month, but that's not a living wage so she and her children bounced between family members and friends for most of those six years. Her fiancé was murdered in 2010, and that

worsened the downward spiral. In February of 2015 she was at the end of her rope and heard about Hagar's House. She decided to take a chance and go to the shelter.

Her experience at the shelter was very uplifting, despite having to be out of the shelter during the days since this is an emergency shelter that houses mothers and their children from dinner to breakfast only. Likeyshia and her children felt welcome and, for the first time in a long time, felt like they belonged. They each had their own beds for the first time, and they had their own private bathroom. They also had support systems to draw from at Hagar's House that are there for both mothers and children.

Ms. Staples's article shared that more than 10,000 people in metro Atlanta experience homelessness on any given night, and more than 40 percent of this number are women and children. Likeyshia was one of the lucky ones who found a safe haven at a shelter. Hagar's House is a part of Decatur Cooperative Ministry, a non-profit ministry that helps "families facing homelessness settle into safe, stable homes and build healthy lives filled with peace, hope and opportunity." The people of Epiphany have been involved with the work at Hagar's House from the beginning, as we have served dinners, been lead volunteers for the evenings, tutored the children, helped with funding, and chaperoned on holidays so the residents could stay in the shelter during the day.

Our next week to serve dinners at Hagar's House is October 26 to 31.

Two families work together to provide the evening meal for 25 - 30 guests at the shelter. One family provides the entrée and a side or two; the other family fills in with salad or a side, bread, dessert . . . You arrive at the shelter at 6 p.m. and leave by 8. You receive very specific instructions on the process so that you are comfortable with what you are doing. Best of all, you are providing food and being a welcoming presence for people like Likeyshia and her children. We also have two new options for helping with dinner: To prepare food at home but not serve to the shelter or to donate money to sponsor a dinner one night. P.S. While at the shelter, Likeyshia got a cashier's job at Lowes and is now earning a living wage. She and her family have moved out of the shelter into more permanent housing and started a new chapter.

Hagar's House asks for help to extend shelter hours for the residents every year during the Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's holidays. Our volunteer help allows the families to stay in the shelters during the day. (Hagar's House is an overnight shelter, so residents leave after breakfast and return in time for dinner.) The need for assistance is on November 26 and 27 (Thursday and Friday), December 24 and 25, and January 1. Volunteer shifts are two hours long, and there will be training closer to the holidays. 
Daughters of the King

Peer to Peer Support Group



First Baptist Church Conversations



Kaitlin Roig-Debellis is the first-grade teacher at Sandy Hook Elementary School who saved her entire class of fifteen six-and-seven-year-olds from the tragic events that took place on December 14, 2012, by piling them into a single-occupancy bathroom within her classroom, mere feet from the brutal and indiscriminate massacre taking place outside the door.

Since then, despite the unimaginably painful experiences she endured, she has chosen to share her experience with others, in the hope that they too can find light in dark moments. *Choosing Hope* is a lot of things. A written witness to a tragedy that will never be forgotten. A gripping firsthand testament to the power of good over the power of destruction. An inspirational memoir by a brave young woman whose story is one of courage, heroism, faith, and resilience. And a celebration of all the people who make the choice to pass along their hope and positivity to young ones—parents, mentors, and especially teachers. There is no moving on, but there is always moving forward. And how we move forward is a choice.
