## YESSSSSSSSSSSS


He was the most excited I have seen someone at the altar rail in my time as a priest. He was a little guy, maybe 3 or 4, and I noticed him squirming out of the corner of my eye. As I approached him, I knelt down, and offered him “The Body of Christ, the Bread of Heaven” to which he replied with a huge grin: YESSSSSSSSSSSSSS!!!

I love being a priest. We get to be with people in joyous moments, like Keith and Joey’s wedding, and we are invited into the most vulnerable moments too, when a relationship falls apart, or a loved one dies. It is both life-giving and at times energy-draining, but the fullness is such a gift.

I am writing this newsletter today from the quad at The University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee. It is a beautiful fall day “on the mountain,” as we say, and it is the annual gathering of the Board of Trustees, to which I was elected by our diocese, now in my second term. We gather and hear about the University, of which Atlanta is one of 28 owning dioceses, did you know that? The board includes our 28 diocesan bishops, a clergy person and two lay people from each diocese. Not to mention representatives from the student body, and the school of theology, the staff and faculty, and alumni. In total this board is some 150 members strong. And for these two days, we will learn how we can best support the only Episcopal university and seminary on the same campus in this country.

I love this place, particularly after spending my three years of seminary here. And I love representing our diocese, and Epiphany as a trustee. There is still so much work, though, as you might have guessed, at The University of the South. Of the 28 owning bishops, there has never once been a woman diocesan bishop here. And our bishop and Presiding Bishop-elect Michael Curry are the only two black bishops.

Oh, speaking of Michael Curry - I won the lottery! Yes, there was a lottery to get a ticket to go to Washington National Cathedral on Sunday, November 1, 2015, for the installation of our new presiding bishop, and I won a ticket! I will represent Epiphany proudly!



Did I mention I love being a priest? Today, as we all gathered to celebrate the Eucharist in All Saints’ Chapel here in Sewanee, I thought about that little guy at the altar rail, and under my breath whispered “yesssssssss” upon receiving Christ’s body. Let’s be that excited to be Christ’s body in the world, wherever we may be.

## Repentance & Reconciliation

The murder of nine parishioners at Mother Emmanuel in Charleston SC is a striking example of the racism and hate in our society. In the weeks that followed, we as a parish - not unlike many others - joined together to talk about our feelings, our actions, and our assumptions. We wanted to do something...but what? A group of parishioners have kept the discussion alive, and we invite our parish, our diocese, and anyone interested to join us in these next steps in our struggle.

We will have a service of repentance and reconciliation in the season of Advent on Thursday, December 10, at 7 p.m. To prepare our hearts for this service, Epiphany will offer some preparation sessions. During these sessions, we will define and discuss how racism and white privilege affect each of us. We want to educate ourselves about race-based inequality in the United States in order to prepare our hearts for the service of reconciliation and repentance. We will not encourage guilt, but understanding. Not hate, but love. We must do this hard work, so we will be aware of the systemic race-based favoritism present throughout society. We will explore the words of repentance and reconciliation that we will confess and embrace in the liturgy. (Please note: these are repeating sessions. You only need to attend ONE session.)


## Daughters of the King



## 27<sup>th</sup> Annual Homeless Requiem


All are welcome to remember the homeless among us and those who have died. Please join us in fellowship and support at our

## Cathedral recitals



## Conversations at First Baptist Church

Diana Butler Bass will discuss her new book, *Grounded*, on Thursday, November 12, 2015, at 7:00 p.m., at First Baptist Church Decatur (308 Clairemont Avenue, Decatur, GA 30030). This event is sponsored by Georgia Center for the Book and hosted by Conversations. No tickets or

reservations are required.


The headlines are clear: religion is on the decline in America as many people leave behind traditional religious practices. Diana Butler Bass, leading commentator on religion, politics, and culture, follows up her acclaimed book *Christianity After Religion* by arguing that what appears to be a decline actually signals a major transformation in how people understand and experience God.

The distant God of conventional religion has given way to a more intimate sense of the sacred that is with us in the world. This shift, from a vertical understanding of God to a God found on the horizons of nature and human community, is at the heart of a spiritual revolution that surrounds us – and that is challenging not only religious institutions but political and social ones as well.

*Grounded* explores this cultural turn as Bass unpacks how people are finding new spiritual ground by discovering and embracing God everywhere in the world around us—in the soil, the water, the sky, in our homes and neighborhoods, and in the global commons. Faith is no longer a matter of mountaintop experience or institutional practice; instead,

people are connecting with God through the environment in which we live. *Grounded* guides readers through our contemporary spiritual habitat as it points out and pays attention to the ways in which people experience a God who animates creation and community.

Bass brings her understanding of the latest research and studies and her deep knowledge of history and theology to *Grounded*. She cites news, trends, data, and pop culture, weaves in spiritual texts and ancient traditions, and pulls it all together through stories of her own and others' spiritual journeys. *Grounded* observes and reports a radical change in the way many people understand God and how they practice faith. In doing so, Bass invites readers to join this emerging spiritual revolution, find a revitalized expression of faith, and change the world.



### November 19

Sue Grafton will discuss her new book, *X*, on Thursday, November 19, 2015, at 7:00 p.m., at First Baptist Church Decatur (308 Clairemont Avenue, Decatur, GA 30030). This event is sponsored by Georgia Center for the Book and hosted by Conversations. No tickets or reservations are required.

*X*: The number ten. An unknown quantity. A mistake. A cross. A kiss. *X*: The shortest entry in Webster's Unabridged. Derived from Greek and Latin and commonly found in science, medicine, and religion. The most graphically dramatic letter. Notoriously tricky to pronounce: think xylophone. *X*: The twenty-fourth letter in the English alphabet.

Sue Grafton's *X*: Perhaps her darkest and most chilling novel, it features a remorseless serial killer who leaves no trace of his crimes. Once again breaking the rules and establishing new paths, Grafton wastes little time identifying this sociopath. The test is whether Kinsey can prove her case against him before she becomes his next victim

NPR's Maureen Corrigan said, "Makes me wish there were more than 26 letters." With only two letters left, Grafton's many devoted readers will share that sentiment.
