Reminders from Pastoral Care

As we move quickly into fall, we also move into the busiest months of the church year. It always seems that the months from October to June fly by and so, with that in mind, we want to remind you of one of our primary goals as a community - to offer pastoral care to attend to the needs of the Parish. This reminder is two-fold: 1) to be sure you know about pastoral services we offer as a parish family, and 2) to invite those who want to offer their time and talent as pastoral caregivers in one of these capacities.

The following is a list of our current pastoral care offerings:

Food

What we offer: We have experienced the love of a warm meal when a family member dies. We also offer to deliver a frozen casserole that can be prepared when you need it, be it after a death, or at the birth of a newborn, or when someone is in the hospital. Here in the South, we say we care with food!

What we need: Are you willing and able to prepare a yummy casserole that we can place in the freezer for the times when a church member needs a little help getting dinner on the table? Or are you interested in preparing a hot meal for a family and then delivering the meal to the family as needed? If you aren't a great cook or simply don't have the time, would you be willing to pick up a casserole from church or a hot meal that someone else has made and deliver it to the church member in need of a tasty dinner? Think of it as God's own take-out service!

Funeral Receptions

When we have a funeral at the church, we offer punch and cookies after the services to help folks spend a few minutes with others reflecting on the person who has died. Would you be willing to help others gather cookies and punch and have them ready after the service?



Pastoral Care

Transportation

Often times individuals have a hard time getting to church, either because of age, a disability or an injury that keeps them from driving. Need a ride? Would you be willing to pick up a church member from their home, drive them to church and see that they get back home safely?

Guild of the Christ Child

What could be more joyous than welcoming a new baby to Epiphany? The Guild has several different activities including:

- Maintaining our bulletin board – prepare the bulletin board with a picture and new arrival information
- Banners – make the beautiful banners that celebrate children as they are baptized into the life of the church
- Home visits with new parents – sometimes after the birth or adoption of a new baby it just helps to have an adult stop by for some adult conversation! These visits will be offered to new parents and covered as wanted/needed.

Prayer Warriors

Ever wonder about the list of those requesting our prayers? Want to know who else is praying? Our Prayer Warriors are a group of individuals in the church who are intentional about praying for the needs of others. This is a new group at Epiphany but we're strong! The group is aiming to help Benno and Sharon to follow up with parishioners to check on their family members you put on our prayer list.

Recycling at Epiphany

We take advantage of DeKalb County Recycling's residential pickup service, and have receptacles around the parish for paper, and then receptacles for plastic and cardboard in the kitchen.

Glass recycling, however, is another matter. DeKalb County does not recycle glass. However, Epiphany is still willing to do it, but you need to be sure that you put glass in a **separate blue bucket in the kitchen**, and at least once a month, or when a container is full, staff or members of the recycling crew will take it to the Farmer's Market or to their homes in Decatur, where glass curb recycling does happen.

Volunteer: We have a small but loyal crew of volunteers who come Sunday after church or Monday mornings and go around the church, collect everything and take it to the curb for pickup by noon. It would be nice to have a couple more people on the rotation, so if you'd like to help with this behind-the-scenes ministry, you can sign up at <http://www.epiphany.org/ministries/people.html>

Other Recycling: We also have small containers on the kitchen counter to recycle your batteries and natural corks. This is taken care of by members of the Earth Guild, which also hosts a couple of electronic recycling events a year. Directory Update

As of today, Epiphany has 1,050 Active and Others Active members that represent 443 households.

That's a lot of people for your clergy and staff to care for. And we do try to keep track of everyone. It's too much for us to go over the entire directory at one sitting each year when it's time to fill out the parochial report for the diocese, so instead, at each weekly staff meeting, we go over one page of database membership report - approximately 10 households. We are checking in to make sure we know what is going on with a member or family pastorally, or to see if there's a parishioner who might be the ideal volunteer for something, or just to make sure that we know members as well as we can, who come to worship on Sundays.

Our Senior Associate Rector Sharon Hiers has passed her one and half year mark with us and Catherine Breed, our Children's Ministries Director, just passed her one year anniversary, so it's understandable if they haven't quite put all the faces with names yet. But with this many people on the rolls, even Julie (5 years), Benno (10 years) and even me, Shea (19 years), still run across folks we can't identify. And now our new seminarian, Mark Merritt, and our new Youth Ministries Coordinator, Shereetha Jackson, have joined us and they are starting from scratch!

We'd love your help with this.

Our parish database is available online to members. So if you have never visited it online, or if it has been awhile, would you please take a moment to go visit and update your membership information?

Tour of Ranglin Biofeedstocks, LLC

October 29: Phillip Ranglin, a member of the Earth Guild, has invited us on a tour of his

composting company, Ranglin Biofeedstocks, LLC on Saturday, October 29, beginning at 11 a.m. Not only does he have regular and earthworm composting, he also has a container garden for growing vegetables, including corn, beans, etc., and he has a green house on the property.

Phillip uses solar power; he also has a backup generator if he needs it but hasn't yet. He harvests rainwater in a 250-gallon tote, and uses a gray water recycling system to water the plants in his container garden.

An environmental microbiologist by training, Phillip has always been an advocate for the environment. His small business originally started with the intention of pure algae farming, but the composting element came into being when he noticed a lack of sustainably-sourced carbon dioxide and decided to use organic waste materials as the source of that raw material. He uses a patent pending process to trap as much carbon dioxide as possible, keeping it out of the atmosphere.

He can only accommodate 15 persons, so sign up soon.

Altar Arrangements & Sanctuary Light

Altar Flowers

Each Sunday, with the exception of Lent, flowers are placed on the high altar area. There are occasions when the church takes on a more festive look such as Christmas and Easter. Flowers are offered “for the Glory of God and in thanksgiving or in memory of a person or event.” Parishioners offer altar flowers as a visible sign of acknowledgement of God’s presence in their lives. The color and selection of flowers is based on the appropriateness of the liturgical season. More than one person or family may sign up for the altar flowers during the same week.

Sanctuary Light

The Sanctuary Light is a visible sign of the presence of the Blessed Sacrament held in reserve in the Tabernacle. It is the

tradition of our faith that parishioners make an offering to acknowledge the memory of a loved one in his or her life—especially appropriate during the week or day of an anniversary date of someone’s death.

Thursday Shared Silence (7 a.m.) is a drop-in time for anyone who wants to sit with others in prayer, meditation, or self-reflection. The time is unprogrammed; come as you are and join a relaxed, open atmosphere.

October 22, 10 a.m. – 2 p.m.


