



Why I Pledge to Epiphany

I pledge to Epiphany because the parish enriches my life individually and collectively in countless ways. Our worship service creates a space for me as an individual and for us as a parish to be in the world spiritually with God through praying, singing, meditating, and listening.

- witness the baptism of young children
- hear parishioners reading scripture
- listen to clergy give key insight to our lived experience as Episcopalians
- pray out loud for the people

In each case I got to participate in a collective expression that made a difference, while also nurturing my own soul. This special place can keep contributing to our individual and collective lives because we support it with our financial pledges.

Buildings & Grounds Update

New Renter at Epiphany

Last week, Little Forest Preschool (LFP) started their school year at Epiphany.



LFP is a half-day, nature-immersion preschool for children ages 3-5 that meet on our grounds from 9 a.m. – 1 p.m. weekdays and will be using Room 204, along with our playground and other outdoor spaces. The school consists of just one class of 14 children. Their director, Deb Long, has been teaching for nine years. You can learn more about the school by visiting littleforestatl.com.

Mr. Mister

As part of our prep-work with the new preschool, their director introduced us to Mr. Mister who is spraying the playground area for mosquitoes. Part of our deal with them is a partner give-back program, where if they receive 10 references from our parishioners, they will donate 5% of the annual net proceeds from those referred customers back to Epiphany. So if you have been meaning to treat your property for mosquitoes, please mention us to Mr. Mister.

Projects, Projects, Projects

Relatively new parish member and new B&G Chair Tom Hairston hit the ground running in March with an extensive punch list of items needing attention, and has been checking them off, along with help from our small band of dedicated B&G Committee Members.

Two major projects happened in the sanctuary:

1. Moving the Baptismal font to the aisle and reducing the pew lengths was spearheaded by Bill Graves with an assist by Alex Sherrill and John Yntema.
2. Bill's wonderful wood-working skills also came in handy once again as he took an 8' altar and downsized it to fit in the new chapel space (formerly known as the baptismal area).



Two other big projects recently completed:

1. Replacement of the non-functioning water fountain in the office area. Bob Ballou handled the electrical upgrade work needed, Alex handled the install, and all of it was possible with funding by David Draper (the staff especially thanks you!).
2. Long-awaited move of the church sound system rack from the choir loft to the flower guild room. Again, thanks to an assist from Bob and Alex. Alex has also been taking the lead on helping Shea figure out our new recording system in the church. We've had a few false starts, but we hope to be able to upload sermons to the web-site soon.

More items tackled by Tom and his crew:

- There's been some unexpected work – a couple of more roof leaks he's had to run down, and regular maintenance issues such as unclogging gutters and

downspouts that revealed other issues, like rotten wood on the exterior that he has seen to. Bob saved the day earlier this year with an a/c drain drip valve that clogged up and flooded both Room 206 and the kitchen, and then more recently was instrumental in dealing with and resolving the gas meter leak outside.

- The undercroft (area under the organ) got a major clean out. Bob put in better lighting and Alex and John have been helping Tom out with the drainage issues down there.
- The storm cellar (area under Jones Hall) also got a major clean out including proper disposal of old paint cans and recycling of wood pallets and really old metal chairs.
- While the work is ongoing, John and Tom have been working with the preschool director and her parent volunteers to get the playground in shape.
- Shea and Alex reorganized the table/chair room off the kitchen and thanks to a financial assist from a parishioner, some of the older damaged tables were retired and a few new light-weight plastic ones were obtained. Shea was also very happy that Tom was able to reclaim a chair rack from storage to help keep the parish hall free of stacks of chairs, and Alex organized and tricked out the media cart for the projector to keep all the accessories better organized.
- Liefy Smith and Ann Fowler worked together to redo and resize the rector portraits which, with help from George Smith, were rehung in the hall outside the nursery.
- Lots of small projects have been checked off, like drywall repair, ceiling tile replacements, basket holders in the attic for flower guild seasonal storage, pressure washing the sidewalks, adding bumpers to various carts to curb wall damage (thanks to George Smith) and lots and lots of lightbulb changes (thanks to Brian Gross).

While that's most, but not everything, completed over the last six months, there's still a few things left to do on the list—which, of course, is never ending. If you are handy, or even if you're not, but are willing and want to help out, please contact Tom Hairston


Ladies Trivia Night

This fall we are reading *Of Mess and Moxie* by Jennifer Hatmaker. The group



Epiphany's Art Ministry welcomes work by Helene Johnson for August

Artist Bio

Helene Johnson is a seasoned artist whose training includes a Bachelor of Fine Arts from Rhode Island School of Design (1954), a Master of Arts in Teaching from Harvard Graduate School of Education (1955), and coursework at Columbia and American Universities.

She taught art in Arlington, Virginia, for several years, and then headed to San Francisco, where she worked as a "paste-up" artist in a print shop while taking education courses to qualify to teach in California.

While waiting, she applied for a teaching position in Maracaibo, Venezuela... and was hired! Before long she

met Perry Johnson. They married and had four children. While the children were growing up, Helene taught art at a few private special education schools, and dedicated her time to the work of the Learning Disabilities Association of GA. One of her most meaningful contributions was to create "Celebrating Abilities", an annual exhibit of art by Georgia students with specific learning disabilities and/or Attention Deficit Disorders. Over the course of eight years, the creative works of over 3000 students, grades K-12, were viewed by the public.

More recently, after the death of her husband, Helene started taking art classes, at Chastain Art Center. Ben Smith and Marie Matthews were two teachers that had particular influence on her artistic development. In 2012, Helene joined the Atelier of Michael David, nationally renowned contemporary artist. His influence took her out of her "comfort zone" and gave her the courage to break the rules of her more traditional training.

Now, at age 85, Helene paints in her studio in Gallery A in Stone Mountain Village. She says she is "still learning".


Weekday Worship

Emmaus House Pantry Drive

August is Epiphany's month to provide food for the Emmaus House Food Pantry. Emmaus House (www.emmaushouse.org) is a mission of the Diocese of Atlanta located in Peoplestown, a low-income neighborhood just south of Turner Field.

Thanks to a generous gift from the Atlanta Community Food Bank, 2 years ago Emmaus House doubled the size of its food pantry. This expansion allows participants to choose the groceries they need, much like most of us do when we go to the grocery store.

Below is a list of requested items. Please place your items in the large wooden boxes on wheels at the front entrance. Contact Lisa Daily (404.421.4898) if you have any questions.



Requested Items (Please NO Expired Items)

- Meal kits that don't require extra ingredients: Kits that include canned meat, canned sauce and pasta all in one box are great choices
- Canned soups and pasta meals
- Canned meat: Tuna, Chicken, Salmon, Potted meat blends, Sardines
- Canned fruits and vegetables

- Basic staple pantry items: Flour, sugar, cornmeal, rice, dry beans, oil, shortening, baking soda and powder, vanilla extract and seasonings of all kinds (garlic, pepper, salt, chili powder, etc.)
- 100% juice
- Household cleaning supplies and paper products: Toilet paper, paper towels, bleach, sanitizing solutions, sanitizing wipes and basic cleaning supplies are very welcomed by those in need.
- Hygiene products: Deodorant, soap, toothpaste, shaving cream, maxi pads, tampons, panty liners and even feminine wipes

Emmaus House provides education, opportunity, assistance, and advocacy in partnership with its neighbors in Peoplestown. In June alone, Emmaus House served 132 households, consisting of 367 household members. Last year Emmaus House distributed over 30,000 pounds of food.
