Rest

I played the trumpet in Junior High Concert Band. The brass (my opinion of course) always carried the day. We sat in the back on elevated platforms: two players upon each one.

One of our favorite pranks was to lean over to our neighbor's platform, and with all our might blow....

...If we were successful, their sheet music would ruffle off their stand as they frantically tried to catch it before it hit the ground. Of course our conductor despised us for this when he caught us at it, as did the woodwind section that invariably would be the unappreciative recipients of sheet music for trumpet. We thought it was hilarious and of course we indemnified ourselves by only doing such miscreants acts during a 'rest'.

A rest is such a delightful piece of music. It is an inherently paradoxical thing. A rest is arguably not music per se, yet it is the preparation for music, the antecedent that makes space for sound, the necessary intake of breath or feeling or thought or context that is essential to composition improvised or agonized over, a rest is the ex nihilo, the nothingness that isn't nothingness at all but the fullness of everything and nothing all at once so that something can come along.

A rest is what Julie is going to have. She is our spectacular chief. She is the conductor, the organizer, the recruiter, the caregiver, the genius, the voice, the eight-armed bell ringer, our impresario at the bench.

Julie is going on sabbatical. She is going to rest.

Rest, for me in band was always a time to keep time, to measure, balance, breathe, be silly if not with my neighbor at least inside my own head, to dream about what came next, to prepare, and make sure I was ready for the next note that came my way.

Julie is going on sabbatical to rest. She is going to rest the way musicians do. I know she will keep time; hopefully a bunch of it will be with Terri and the rest of her family. She is going to prepare—she has American Guild of Organist stuff to do. She is going to dream I know, about music here, at the ocean, in the mountains, in the sanctity of her front porch, kitchen, back porch in the spheres as they keep their course day in and day out. She is going to rest. She is going to breathe in and breathe out at a different rhythm and with a different tune in her head a tune of, well rest. She starts her rest on May 20th.

For our part we will keep time, tapping time. We will sing a little more recklessly I am sure. We will blow the music off the stand of the person next to us in gentle reminder that Julie is watching and we are waiting, resting until she returns.


Epiphany's Art Ministry is very excited to welcome artwork by Epiphany's own Terry Howell for May 2018.



Quilters Dozen Continues

Fabrics, needles, rotary cutters, ironing boards, and community. If you look in the corner of the Parish Hall on Wednesday evenings, you'll see it too. Twelve of us took on a Lenten practice to create a Books-of-the-Bible (BOTB) quilt. Master quilters gave of their talents to the novices, and each of us made six 6" blocks, give or take. One each week until all 73 books are complete. We will then piece the blocks together to form the quilt top. Then we sandwich the layers together and do the old-timey quilting bee task of actually quilting (sewing) the layers together.

I'd like to thank my friends who were daring enough to try this exercise: Janet, Rachele, Terry-Lee, Shirley, Michelle, Tracey, Sara, Joy, Lane, Laura, and Cristin (the poster child of quilting who knew zero about quilting, yet faithfully and gracefully finished her six blocks). A few more people stepped in just when they were needed ... Linda, Sam, Alix, and Mary Ann. Thank you.

Even though the BOTB quilt is not completed, we are moving forward with another quilt: the Women of the Bible (WOTB). It differs from the BOTB in color, block dimension, and piecing. It will have some unifying aspects so the two

quilts can be hung together. If you would like to try your hand at this (like Barbara and Kimberly), I invite you to meet with one of us and sign out a block on Wednesday the 9th or 16th, or any Sunday. Altar Arrangements & Sanctuary Light

Altar Flowers

Each Sunday, with the exception of Lent, flowers are placed on the high

altar area. There are occasions when the church takes on a more festive look such as Christmas and Easter. Flowers are offered “for the Glory of God and in thanksgiving or in memory of a person or event.” Parishioners offer altar flowers as a visible sign of acknowledgement of God’s presence in their lives. The color and selection of flowers is based on the appropriateness of the liturgical season. More than one person or family may sign up for the altar flowers during the same week.

Sanctuary Light

The Sanctuary Light is a visible sign of the presence of the Blessed Sacrament held in reserve in the Tabernacle. It is the tradition of our faith that parishioners make an offering to acknowledge the memory of a loved one in his or her life—especially appropriate during the week or day of an anniversary date of someone’s death.

Weekday Worship





Emil Viklicky, the noted jazz pianist from the Czech Republic, is returning to Atlanta as part of his current U.S. tour.
